Evil is the denial of goodness as well as the destruction of intelligence, affection and beauty—which transforms the life of the envious person into complete mediocrity.

Client: I am worse than others

Analyst: How so? I asked.

Client: I don't have the same gifts as they do.

Analyst: You were created similar to everyone, but because of your excessive envy you have become (among) the worst.

Generally the human being wants to place the origin of his problems outside himself, and not in this terrible “feeling” (envy) which is so difficult to control.

Client: Nothing is good enough for my mother. She is dissatisfied with everything.

Analyst: Does she give you this consciousness?

Client: Could it be a problem similar to the envy I have?

Analyst: You're the one who said it!

Client: I have to admit that I am never satisfied with anything!

The human being believes that he lives in the most advanced civilization, has the best knowledge and progress, and what's worse believes he possesses these marvels even though he doesn't deserve them in the least.

Client: First I married a lazy bum; then I fell in love with a crook; and now a drunk.

Analyst: Don't you think it's important to know the difficulties you create in your life?

Client: How so?

Analyst: Because that's the only way to improve them?

The great problem here is the absence of goodness in which the person places himself, unable to verify that he has rejected what was best in his life, cutting off everything that was good for him.

Client: Now my colleagues at work tell me how I am and I am accepting to see it.

Analyst: Then you are losing the fear of seeing yourself the way you are?

Client: It seems as if that's the case.

We must admit that man's greatest difficulty is to accept to see what he has become; I believe that his greatest fear is precisely to confront what he has done to himself.

Client: My client told the judge exactly the opposite of what I advised him to say, losing the case.

Analyst: In this case, he really wanted to lose.

Client: So why did he hire me then?

Analyst: This is the great problem of inversion that the human being endures: he wants goodness but acts wickedly; he loves life but delivers himself to death.

The unconscious is the result of the fight against goodness, which the human being wages his entire life; I can affirm that the unconscious does not exist in and of itself—being a denial of consciousness, which is why it feels as if it is a very important entity in the psychological life – and not simply the denial of what is most precious.
